# Abuja Petroleum Roundtable #2

**THEME: Oil and Human Development in Nigeria**

**Date:** Monday October 13, Tuesday October 14, 2008 **Venue:** Transcorp Hilton, Abuja.

After a very successful maiden Abuja Petroleum Roundtable in March last year, there was a quiet period which resulted from some hiccups in our organizing machinery, which we are pleased to say have been sorted out. We have however had to skip the first half of 2008, which is the reason APR II is holding in October.

An APR Consultative Forum which held at the Lagos Sheraton Hotel in December last year outlined the activities for 2008, giving a lot of focus to the crises in the Niger Delta: the resultant security and development issues they have created; and above all, how best to tackle and resolve these problems completely. The APR Consultative Forum resolved to hold joint monthly consultative meetings with membership of the State Houses of Assembly/State Executive Councils, rotated among the Niger Delta states-starting with Cross River State in February, through Akwa Ibom in March and so on, until all the nine state governments represented on the NDDC Board are completed.

Unfortunately, the escalation of violence in the region saw a poor response to the arrangements, which led to its temporary suspension. It is therefore in the spirit of that consultative arrangement with the ruling class of the oil producing states, that APR 2008 derived its theme: "Oil and Human Development in Nigeria". The

Niger Delta problem is in the main, a human development problem and the most potent vehicle for resolving them remains the State Governments and to some extent, local governments. How the oil producing states fare will be a model for all the other states in the Nigerian Federation, in tackling their peculiar human development challenges.

Interestingly, the regional master plan designed by the Niger Delta Development Commission recognizes the peculiarities of each state and provides for each state to implement the milestones at its own pace, using its own peculiar endowments. The carefully selected lead presentations and plenary speakers, as well as the all governors' panel discussions have been fashioned to fine tune the economic development and poverty eradication strategies of the state governments.

Since the advent of the Yar'dua government, many of the governors of the oil producing states have come up with some ideas and have even developed niches where they want to create comparative advantages for their respective states: For instance, Cross River has put in enormous effort to become the frontline state in tourism; Bayelsa is embarking on massive infrastructure development to enhance tourism opportunities; Governor Uduaghan is embarking on urban renewal and a development paradigm which recognizes that oil is a depleting resource; Governor Theodore Orji of Abia State is adopting a

welfare approach, while Ohakim, his Imo state counterpart is implementing a "green project" and "a new face of Imo"; Rotimi Amaechi of Rivers is focusing on security, while Lagos States' Fashola expects to use the emerging status of Lagos as an oil producer and E&P Deepwater logistics centre for the Gulf of Guinea as additional impetus to build a mega city, which will continue to be Nigeria's number one entry port and economic capital.

In all the above development paradigms there are hitches and challenging limitations. Cross River State for instance, with all its good intentions, has only N200million as monthly internally generated revenue. This does not reflect the billions of naira spent on oilfield contracts and other oil related activities within its territories annually. Correcting the disconnect between billions of dollars spent in oil operations in the Niger Delta and the abject poverty in the region is the core of the quest for peace.

APR II will therefore provide a sound platform for clear headed appraisal of all the options and practical solutions available in addressing the poverty and underdevelopment of the Niger Delta; is the vexed agitation for resource control the answer, when the state governments have been accused of not giving a good account of themselves with what they have so far?; what about the Federal Government's experiment in awarding marginal fields to

Bayelsa and Akwa Ibom State Governments- does this represent a way out of the logjam?; Should the 1950s Willinik Report paradigm be revisited as a way forward?

All the above questions will be answered at APR II. We hope that the forum will truly fine-tune the development plans of all the oil producing states (Lagos has been included because of the upcoming production from Aje field near Badagry; its promotion of the "Energy City" project; the Lekki FTZ and Petrochemicals Park; and the Snake Island FTZ and deepwater Operations Logistics centre). Good plans and sound implementation strategies by the state governments will free the Federal government and its agencies like NDDC to focus in actual intervention in strategic infrastructure and other key areas beyond the capacities of the state governments.
